Sandie LaNae and Arline LaFerry speak to Docents, October 5, 10:00 am

Please join us for a program by Sandie LaNae and Arline LaFerry on their new book *Weird Reno*. Front doors will be unlocked at 9:30 am. No Fee for Docent Meetings.

Arline, an NHS docent since 1985, has given school tours, worked with the manuscript collection and in the library at the Society. Arline is an expert on the history of Virginia City and an avid researcher of cemeteries, funeral parlors and dead people.

Arline has collected many of the weird events that have happened in Reno from 1868 to the current time through her research in local newspapers.

Arline suggested to her friend Sandie La Nae that Sandie write a book about all of the weird or strange happenings or events that have taken place in Reno and the surrounding Truckee Meadows. Sandie La Nae, a psychic with the gift to foretell the future, has written several books dealing with the paranormal, history and the healing properties of minerals thought a weird Reno book was "a great idea." That started their "Weird" series with *Weird Reno, Weird Carson City, and Weird Haunted Virginia City*. They plan on writing many more in this series.

Weird Reno includes chapters on the celebrities and famous people born in Reno, the songs that have Reno in the title or in the lyrics and movies filmed in Reno and surrounding area. It also tells about the famous and not so famous Reno residents. Such as Did D. A. Bender and his brother who estabished the first bank in Reno to exchange the checks given to the railroad workers into coin. Houses are also written about including the Pedericini house on Second and West Streets with its ghost that Father Tubman was called in to "exorcise this spirit?" The Murder & Mystery chapter tells of the murder of J. N. Sharp who was cut to pieces with an ax in 1875. J. W. Rover was convicted and sentenced to hang for the murder on February 20, 1878. Sheriff Lamb "issued 100 invitations for the hanging."

Hillside Cemetery

The Sierra Memorial Gardens, owners of the Hillside Cemetery, have an exhumation permit to disinter over 800 bodies from the Hillside Cemetery, Reno's oldest cemetery. The Hillside Cemetery Volunteers report that the disinternments have been temporarily suspended but the exhumation permit issued by the Washoe County Department of Public Health is still in effect. Candace Wheeler of the Comstock Cemetery Foundation gave a presentation to the Historical Resources Commission on Thursday, September 22 and the Reno City Council passed a resolution on September 28, 2016 to be an active stakeholder and to "directly participate to the fullest extent of its authority in any future development at Hillside Cemetery."

The Hillside Cemetery Volunteers are asking for help to save the oldest cemetery in the Truckee Meadows. HRPS: Sunday, October 30, 1:00 pm (fourth Sunday)

Jack Harpster, author of *The Genesis of Reno*, presents a history of the Virginia Street Bridge and the Riverside Hotel. Over 157 years ago— before there was a Reno, Nevada; before there was a state of Nevada; and even before there was a Nevada Territory— there was a bridge over the Truckee River at a narrow, deeply rutted cattle and wagon trail that would one day become Virginia Street. There was also a small rustic inn and tavern occupying a plot of ground at the southern end of the log-and-timber bridge, catering to thirsty cowboys, drov-ers, and miners. The inn and the bridge were the first two structures in what would one day be a bustling metropolitan area, and to this day they still form the nucleus of the city they gave rise to. Today, descendants of these two structures are known as the Virginia Street Bridge and the Riverside Artist Lofts. The 111-year-old concrete bridge that was replaced in 2015/16 by a magnificent new structure, was honored for its longevity and unique character by placement on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980; and the Riverside Hotel, the forerunner of the Riverside Artist Lofts, was similarly honored in 1986. This is the remarkable story of these two iconic landmarks around which a major western city has grown, and of the people, the events, and the community that played an important part in shaping their long history.

Debbie Hinman: The Endangered University Neighborhood

For 120 years, a row of lovely, dignified Victorian homes has graced the neighborhood at the foot of the University of Nevada, Reno grounds just below Ninth Street. These homes, as well as other beautiful and significant ones on neighboring streets, are now threatened due to plans for a massive business building and a "gateway" consisting of other new structures which will irrevocably change the character of the district. Debbie will present the history of the area, from its early ownership by pioneers John Newton and Alvaro Evans to the interesting and important residents who created this vibrant neighborhood. The hope is that you will gain an understanding of why the neighborhood is worth saving.
